

THE FINANCIAL STATE OF CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOLS

A new analysis of the latest available audited financial reports found Chicago Public Schools (CPS) has a Taxpayer BurdenTM of \$17,690, earning it a "D" grade from Truth in Accounting.

CPS officials have made repeated financial decisions that have left the school district with a debt burden of \$16 billion. That burden equates to \$17,690 for every Chicago taxpayer. The school district's financial problems stem mostly from unfunded retirement obligations that have accumulated over the years. Of the \$25.4 billion in retirement benefits promised, the district has not funded \$12.4 billion in pension and \$2.2 billion in retiree health care benefits.



Data included in this report is derived from the Chicago Public Schools' 2017 audited Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and retirement plans' reports.

FAST FACTS

- CPS has \$2.8 billion available to pay \$18.8 billion worth of bills.
- The outcome is a \$16 billion shortfall, which breaks down to a burden of \$17,690 per Chicago taxpayer.
- If retirement benefits or other costs are not reduced, then taxpayers could have to pay \$17,690 in future taxes without receiving any related services or benefits to fund the school district's debts.

GRADE: D

Bottom line: Chicago Public Schools would need \$17,690 from each Chicago taxpayer to pay all of its bills. According to Truth in Accounting's grading scale, any government with a Taxpayer Burden between \$5,000 and \$20,000 receives a "D" grade.
